Iowa Extended Learning Initiative Extending Learning Afterschool

The Need:

- » lowa's students are often unprepared for post-secondary employment and education.
- » There is a significant achievement gap between high and low income students in lowa's schools.
- » Many of our students do not have the opportunity to interact with positive adults outside of the classroom.
- » lowa's working families face limited access to child care and afterschool opportunities for their children. Quality programs can be expensive for parents or eligibility-restricted. In some communities there are no options at all.

A number of factors play a role in creating the need, including:

- » Increased competition for high-paying jobs in today's economy.
- » Increased attention on improving test scores means lower priority for electives including foreign language, vocational education, the arts, physical education, and career preparation and exploration.
- » Decreasing investments in child social and emotional well-being, family nutrition and health, family self-sufficiency, and workforce supports including child care, afterschool, and family-friendly employer policies.

With our Extended Learning Day Initiative, the Iowa Afterschool Alliance is assessing how afterschool can meet the social, career, and educational needs of older youth.

- » Oskaloosa and Sioux City, Iowa, are developing afterschool programs targeting ninth-grade youth. Lead organizations for the pilot programs are Indian Hills Community College and the Siouxland Human Investment Partnership, respectively.
- » Programs will begin in the fall of 2011 and run through the school year.
- » The goal of the Extended Learning Day Initiative is to connect older youth with opportunities for 21st Century skill building through partnerships between schools, community colleges, non-profit organizations, and business.
- » Oskaloosa and Sioux City see their respective afterschool programs as a way to connect youth to their communities, with the intention that prepared high school graduates will choose to stay in the community.

The lowa Afterschool Alliance has committed \$7,500 seed grants to both Indian Hills Community College and the Siouxland Human Investment Partnership and will provide in-depth technical assistance and support to both pilot sites. To develop truly innovative, effective programming for youth in their community, additional investment is being sought within the communities.
